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Preparing Required Documents

Before enrolling, you may need to provide:

- **Identification:** Passport, state ID, or other identification.
 - **Proof of Address:** Utility bill or rental agreement.
 - **Immigration Status Documents:** Such as an I-94 or Green Card/VISA.
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Register for Classes

- **Contact the Program:** Call or visit the program office to learn about registration requirements and schedule.
 - **Complete the Application:** Fill out any required forms and submit them.
 - **Assessment Test:** Some programs may require a placement test to determine your level.
 - **Orientation:** Attend the orientation session, if applicable.
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Start Your Classes

Once enrolled, attend classes regularly and practice speaking English as much as possible. Engage in community activities and make use of additional learning resources such as language apps and online practice.
